In addition to our walks along the bike path, we also spent time each day getting energy out on the tennis court by kicking, throwing, bouncing, and chasing after kickballs. We have also been playing games such as "Red Light, Green Light", "Simon Says", and have been singing songs to get our bodies moving.

Sapling Teacher, Birch Grove Community Service

On Monday the Saplings observed Christopher Columbus' discovery of America and concurrently recognized Indigenous People's Day. We continued to hone our cutting skills by crafting replicas of the Nina, Pinta, and Santa Maria and simulating their cross Atlantic journey. Additionally, we constructed a hut modeled after those of the Taino Natives, whom Christopher Columbus encountered upon landing in the Bahamas. We identified the locations of our homes within the United States on both the globe and world map.

This week's music activities involved creating percussion music with Lummi sticks, a musical



instrument named after the Lummi Native American peoples. The sticks' songs target gross and fine motor skills, as well as bilateral coordination, an important skill that will help children develop skills such as tying shoes, getting dressed, playing toss and even riding a bike.

The remainder of the week, our **Monster Mash** theme dominated, featuring explorations of the color purple, monster slime creation, and Monster eye counting. I integrated the two themes through a reading of Maurice Sendak's *Where The Wild Things Are*, Max's sailing journey to the land of wild creatures. This story offers numerous lessons. I focused on the significance of home and the idea that sometimes, no place compares. We explored the elements that make our homes special. We reflected on how the wild things may have terrible roars and teeth and claws, but still embraced Max as one of their own into their tribe.

The Saplings then drew geometric shape-inspired sketches of their own wild thing concepts. I had them replicate visual textures that we observed on the creatures, creating impressive *Wild Things* results.

K & 1st Grade Elementary Teacher

This week was short but sweet. We started a science unit about weather and seasons. We discussed what good weather detectives look for when observing the weather. We drew observations showing what the sky looks like, what types of clothes one should wear, and what the wind is doing based on how much the flag is flying. We will continue to learn about the weather and seasons over the next few weeks.

The first graders learned about parts of a story. We discussed and made a concept map of the characters, setting, and plot. In math, we are learning about how to add by counting on. We can count on from a big digit number now. The students were successful in adding 87+7! Representing subtraction was introduced this week.



The Kindergarteners learned about the letter H. We talked about how it is the puppy dog sound because it is the sound a dog makes when it pants! In math, we are practicing addition and subtraction. We are learning about how adding is more and subtracting is less. The students also learned about and practiced writing numbers 6-10.

2nd & 3rd Grade Elementary Teacher

It has been a wonderful short week! We did a normal week and packed as much learning in as we could. Our focus in social studies was rights, responsibilities, goals, and choices. We practiced learning about tradeoffs through graphic organizers and group discussion. Students talked about how every decision has a trade off or consequences. They also talked about how every goal has multiple alternative routes and how to choose which is best for your lifestyle. In art, we are still learning about the European continent so we did an art project inspired by Picasso.

Reading has started to become a fun and interactive activity. We spend lots of time talking and writing about literature. Comprehension is our goal so I spend time each day asking questions and mapping out stories. This week we focused on the cause and effect skill and the story structure while reading our anchor text. My goal is to have students all be able to monitor their own comprehension so we stop after each page to dive into these skills. We learned about the prefix mis- and created words with that prefix. Also in word study, we learned about what makes words singular or plural and the correct way to adjust words when putting a different ending on. I can't believe the growth that each individual has had already this school year.

In math, we are done with unit 1 this week in both grades. Second graders have spent the last month refining their knowledge and practicing with word problems so that they can take those skills into the next unit with bigger numbers. Third graders practiced their fluency with multiplication and division facts so that they were feeling confident to apply them in multiple ways. I love how hard everybody has been working to become proficient in their skills.

It has been cold at school. Please send your child with hat, mittens, sweatshirt, and coat to school each day. It is better to have these items if needed than not at all. Reach out if you are in need of anything and we are more than happy to help!

4th & 5th Grade Elementary Teacher

This week in reading we took advantage of a short week and practiced our fluency by performing the play "The Three Little Elephants". All students chose a character to play, read their lines in the script, practiced expression and used their strong performance voice. The class really wants to perform for the other classes so we will see if we can fit that in our schedule! In math the 5th graders learned how to convert mixed numbers into improper fractions using pictures at first and then they learned how to do this without the pictures. It is a tough skill! 4th graders are adding up large numbers, rounding to the largest place value and then using the estimate to check their answers.

In Social Studies we are using flashcards to sort and learn about the landforms and bodies of water on our planet. Ask your child to tell you what the following items are; butte, swamp, canyon, delta and many more! We are almost ready to use our mapping skills to start our Pirate Island project. The kids are excited for this project and have been brainstorming themes for their island.

Now that the weather has turned more chilly, please send your child to school with clothes warm enough for outdoor play. We do have items in the front hall of the school if your family is in need of jackets, snow pants, hats, mittens and boots.

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
